AADM STYLE GUIDELINES

Note: If you are using the AADM LaTeX template for preparation of your article, you will find necessary guidelines there, and you do not need this document.

- The title should be centered and followed by a line that contains only name(s) of author(s). This should be followed by a short abstract (not more than 7 lines of printed text). Avoid citations in the abstract, but if they are necessary, do not use labels from the main body of the article. For example, instead of writing “we prove formula (2)”, you should reproduce formula (2), or describe it in words. Instead of writing “we improve the result obtained in [7]”, you should write the full form of the reference [7].
- The manuscript should contain 2010 MSC classification data, in a footnote in the title page, with one primary and at most two secondary classifications. The next footnote on the same page should contain the list of (at most five) keywords and phrases.
- Citations in the body of the manuscript should be like in the following examples:

As shown in [1], ...
Baker [1] has shown that ...

- Sections should be numbered consecutively, and their titles should be centered. The first numbered formula should be denoted by (1), second one by (2), etc. Formulas which are not recalled in the text of the article should not be numbered.
- The manuscript should end with the list of references, entitled "References" and sorted alphabetically by last names. Articles should be cited as

[1] J. A. Baker, *Isometries in normed spaces*, Amer. Math. Monthly **78**(1971), 655–658.

Books should be cited as:

[2] A. Marshall, I. Olkin, "Inequalities: Theory of Majorization and Its Applications", Academic Press, New York, 1979.

- Author's affiliation, address and e-mail address should be displayed after the list of references.
